

# Superintendent of Schools Delivers State of the Schools Address at Town Meeting

Last Monday evening, Superintendent of Schools John Doherty delivered the annual State of the Schools address during Town Meeting. A copy of the address and the power point presentation can be found in the Reading Post Article located here.

During the remarks, Dr. Doherty focused on the tremendous change that has happened in public education over the last five years and the value that public education provides to a community. He gave three examples of how the Reading Public Schools has been addressing that change with limited resources. Those changes include community building (especially over the last few months with the graffiti incidents), the commitment to close the achievement gap with our students (especially for students with disabilities), and the quality of our staff. To conclude his remarks, Dr. Doherty highlighted two students who received the Massachusetts Association School Superintendent's Award for Academic Excellence (see article below) as examples of how we are seeing results of our work. # RMHS Seniors Recognized at Town Meeting Erin Kwon and Mathias Kool Awarded MASS Award

On Monday evening, November 13<sup>th</sup>, at Town Meeting, Superintendent of Schools John Doherty recognized Reading Memorial High School Seniors, Erin Kwon and Mathias Kool during the State of the Schools Address for receiving the Massachusetts Association of School Superintendents Award for Academic and Community Excellence. Only 2 students can receive this award and the criteria include strong academic skills, participation in extracurricular and community service activities, and are currently in the top 5% of their graduating class.

Erin Kwon, attended the Joshua Eaton Elementary School and Parker Middle School and is a member of the Model United Nations Club. She volunteers at the Reading Public Library where she serves as a Net Guide and helps senior citizens use the library technology. A member of the RMHS Symphonic band, this student has excelled in rigorous classes including AP BC Calculus, Physics, AP Biology, AP French, and AP Literature. In addition, this student is in the wind ensemble at the New England Conservatory of Music. This recipient envisions a career in biochemistry and has applied to Northeastern, UMass Amherst, Brown, Harvard, Tufts, Boston College, and Amherst College.

Mathias Kools, also attended Joshua Eaton Elementary School and Parker Middle School and has excelled as a four year member of the RMHS Robotics Team where he has served as a programmer and, now, the business sector president. Academically, this student is a curious and engaged learner who is currently taking several high level courses including AP BC Calculus, AP Statistics, AP Physics, AP French, Philosophy of Literature, and Principles of Engineering. He is very involved in community service activities, teaching swimming to students at the YMCA who have developmental disabilities and mentoring students in computer coding at the Reading Public Library. Next year, he plans on majoring in Computer Science and is applying to MIT, Carnegie Melon, Harvard, Northeastern, UMass Amherst, and RPI.

When Keith Wasserboehr, A16, was working thirteen-hour shifts as a U.S. Navy aviation mechanic in Bahrain, German film studies was the last thing on his mind.

But that class turned out to be one of his favorites during his first semester as an undergraduate at Tufts. At twenty-six, he's embarking on the prerequisites for a psychology major, hoping one day to work with adolescents as a therapist. Wasserboehr is following this dream thanks to a new scholarship created for people with military experience or military ambitions: the Tufts ROTC/Veterans Scholarship.

Before his stint in the navy, few would have seen Wasserboehr as college material. Having endured what he calls a "really tough childhood" in Reading, Massachusetts, he struggled in high school. "I was an awful student—seventh worst in my graduating class," he says. He enlisted two months out of school. After basic training in the Great Lakes, he was assigned to the naval air station on Whidbey Island in Washington. His five years on active duty included deployments in Qatar and Bahrain. "I was never on a ship, which is odd for being in the navy," he says, "but I worked on a plane that was too big to fit on ships"—the P3 Orion, a four-engine reconnaissance aircraft with a hundred-foot wingspan. Keeping the planes airworthy was a huge responsibility. "The pressure on the ground crew was intense," Wasserboehr says. "We used to say we had eight days on, zero days off."

When he left the navy, with the rank of petty officer third class, a company in Connecticut offered him an aviation mechanic position, which he seriously considered taking. "I loved being an aviation mechanic," he says. "I like working with my hands, and I loved the camaraderie." But he had injured his back in the service and had degenerative disc disease. "I just couldn't do it," he says. His wife talked him into going back to school instead.

He enrolled in Middlesex Community College, outside of Boston, where a counselor suggested he transfer to Tufts. The university, he says, had "never been on my radar screen." But he applied and got in.

The ROTC/Veterans Scholarship that supports Wasserboehr was established in May 2014 with contributions from more than seventy Tufts alumni. One of those donors is attorney Gregory Arabian, A54, who graduated from Tufts ROTC and rose to the rank of major in the U.S. Air Force. He says Wasserboehr is just the kind of student he had in mind when he supported Tufts' efforts to raise money for the scholarship.

Arabian served in the air force from 1954 into the 1980s and helped establish AMVETS Post 2008, in Belmont, Massachusetts, of which he is commander. He has volunteered with the Veterans History Project of the Library of Congress. These activities "brought me in contact with many veterans from all walks of life—and brought me closer to Tufts," he says.

Arabian's enthusiasm for Tufts had "badly waned" during the Vietnam era, when student protests caused the closure of ROTC units. "We had to reverse this," he says. "I became one of a handful of Tufts graduates who formed Advocates for Tufts ROTC."

Without the ROTC/Veterans Scholarship, attending Tufts full time would not have been possible, Wasserboehr says. "I want to thank the donors, both for supporting

Arabian believes veterans have much to offer the university. "I admire those who volunteer for service and go through the rigors of training," he says.

These days Wasserboehr is more concerned with the rigors of academia. "The kids here are so driven," he says. "Though I have more worldly experience, it doesn't give me a leg up at all. But I bring a different perspective."

Her unique professional, educational and personal background has resulted in dynamic programs that appeal to all age groups. In February of 2005, Katie L. Greer began developing an Internet safety program to deliver to Massachusetts students. The Corruption, Fraud and Computer Crime Division of the Attorney General's Office was inundated with requests for Internet safety presentations, and Katie rose to the challenge of expanding the existing program she created. After leaving the Attorney General's Office, Katie worked full time as an Intelligence Analyst for the Massachusetts State Police, where she was assigned to the Missing Children Clearinghouse. ## Kirsten Stevens, Class of 2018



Kirsten is being recognized for her excellent achievement in academics, athletics, leadership, and service. Kirsten is in the top 5% of the Senior Class and has received Century Club honors in 9th, 10th, and 11th grade. She is also a member of the National Honor Society and the Spanish National Honor Society, and last year, received the prestigious Clark University Book Award, as well as the Scholarship Award in Physics. Athletically, Kirsten is a 4-year member and co-captain of the Girls Varsity Swim Team.
