Every year, we have the opportunity to bring a speaker to our middle schools, thanks to our local Understanding Disabilities organization. We use this opportunity to learn, to grow, and to appreciate each other. This is also made possible thanks to our Coolidge and Parker PTOs.

This year, we had the pleasure of hearing Collette Divitto speak. Collette was born with Down syndrome. She grew up in Connecticut, where she developed a passion for baking after taking classes in high school. She came up with an original cinnamon chocolate chip cookie that people really enjoyed. Because all of her friends and family raved, "This cookie is amazing," Collette decided to call her recipe "The Amazing Cookie."

After high school, Collette attended Clemson University, and finished a three-year LIFE program in just two years. Collette then decided to turn her passion for baking into a business, and founded Collettey's Cookies. RMHS Art Students Shine in Scholastic Art and Writing Contest

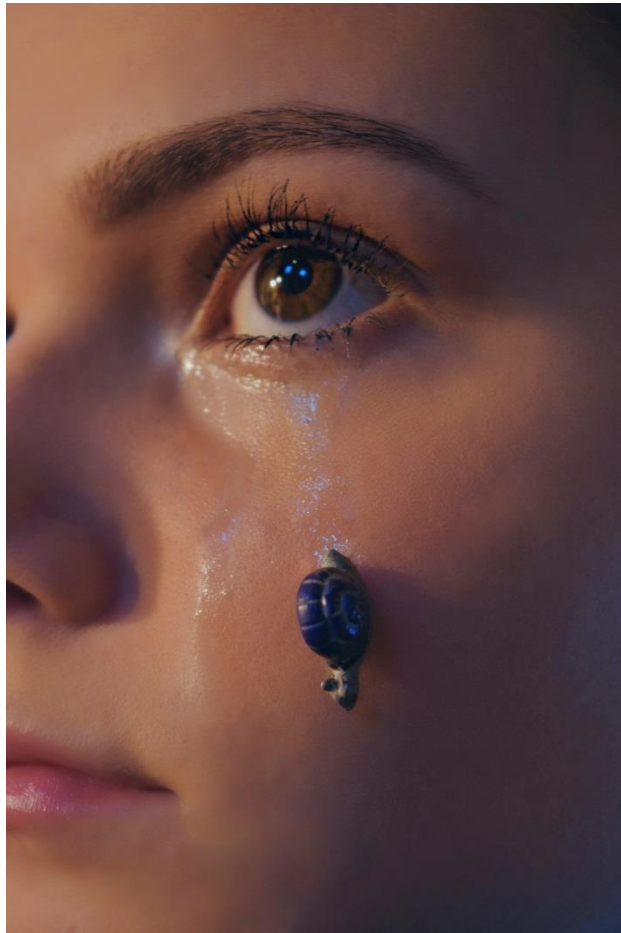

School Committee Approves FY20 Budget

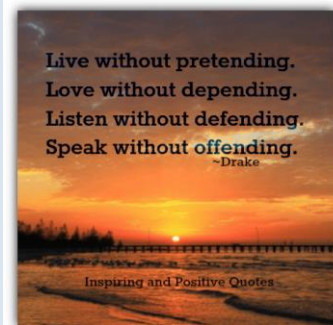
On Monday, January 28th, the Reading School Committee approved the Superintendent's Recommended FY20 Budget of \$46,467,348, a 3.6% increase over the FY19 budget. Below is School Committee Chair Elaine Webb's message to the Community. School Committee's Message FY20 Budget

The Reading School Committee respectfully presents the FY20 School Budget, totaling \$46,467,348, a 3.6% increase over the FY19 School Budget. This unanimously approved budget is aligned with Reading Finance Committee guidance.

The School Committee would like to express enormous gratitude to the voters of Reading, who supported a Proposition 2 1/2 override in April 2018. This additional revenue has had an impact across our district. We have K-6 Curriculum Coordinators for STEM and ELA driving instructional excellence in our elementary schools. At our middle schools, we have maintained the foreign language program. We have added back teaching positions at Reading Memorial High School, decreasing class sizes and increasing elective options for our

students. We have added important oversight for our Special Education programs and we have enhanced and updated curriculum, staff development and technology. In short, our students today are enjoying the same high-quality education Reading students have traditionally enjoyed and Reading residents have come to expect.

Over the past year, the Reading School Committee has successfully completed contract negotiations with all of our collective bargaining units. This will provide budget certainty for the next three years.

Due to the support of the Reading Finance Committee, Town Meeting, and the voters, and through the hard work of our staff, we are at the end of a three-year cycle of updating our science curriculum across the district to align with Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education frameworks. In the FY20 budget, you will find a significant investment in social studies curriculum, to align with the new Massachusetts Curriculum Frameworks for Social Studies, which include a strong emphasis on civics education. We are excited to find new and creative ways to inspire our students to become active participants in our democracy.

While there is much to celebrate, there is an area of the budget that we would like to highlight as a concern. Over the past several years, we have seen significant increases in the Special Education cost center of the budget. Our students with special needs are presenting with more complex and serious issues that impact their ability to access the curriculum. As Special Education programs and services are federally mandated, these costs are completely beyond our control. They are growing at a rate that far outpaces our revenue. Reading is in no way unique in this regard - escalating special education costs are creating budget problems across the Commonwealth. We will be looking to work with our town and state representatives in working towards a sustainable solution for these costs.

Elementary space continues to become an area of increasing challenge and is a constraint that requires capital and longer time frames to address. The need for classroom space is in part driven by increases in special education needs beginning in Pre-K through grade 12 and increases in full-day kindergarten enrollment. The critical Elementary Space and Enrollment Study funded out of capital is beginning and is the initial step toward a long-term comprehensive solution.

We are grateful to the voters of Reading for their generosity, and we take seriously the trust they have put in us with the additional revenue the successful override provides. We are also grateful for our ongoing, collaborative relationship with the municipal side of our government, particularly the Town Manager, Select Board, and Finance Committee. We are grateful for our central office staff, the administrative team, and all our educators who work every day to help our students grow, learn, thrive, and succeed. The budget process is exhaustive, iterative, and data rich setting a standard of excellence among our peer districts. We want to recognize Superintendent John Doherty, Chief Financial Officer Gail Dowd, their administrative teams and all the Principals for their commitment and outstanding work. Finally, we are grateful for our students and their parents, who make the Reading Public Schools the most wonderful places to grow and learn.

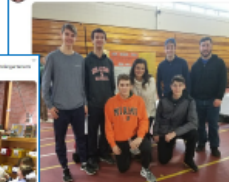
Hello from Learning & Teaching

District Curriculum Committee Updates

The following District Wide Committees are up and running.

Professional Development Committee: Information is shared above. Please reach out if you would like to be a part of this team.

Elementary Report Card Committee: Meets bi-monthly this spring in order to update our K-5 Standards Based Report Cards. Members of the team may be seeking your input on our current model as well as soliciting feedback as we develop new drafts. Thank you to members of this important team.

Middle School Social Studies Committee: New Social Studies Frameworks were published late last year. We have decided to focus initially on the middle school curriculum as the new 8th grade standards, focused on Civics, necessitate a significant revision.

Elementary Math Committee: The committee will begin meeting early February to begin the process of mapping mathematics curriculum K-5. The committee sign-ups closed January 25th, committee members will be contacted soon.

Middle School Math Committee: This group will analyze curriculum options to identify top potential curriculum resources to be piloted in 2019-2020 for seventh and eighth grade.

Parker Student Proudly Represents Reading in Project 351

Parker Grade 8 student Shreya Bajaj is representing the Reading Public Schools this year in Project 351. Project 351 is an independent nonprofit organization that builds a movement of youth-led service by engaging an unsung hero from each of Massachusetts' 351 cities and towns. United for a year of leadership and service, Ambassadors transform communities, elevate kindness, advance social justice, and gain the courage, compassion, and capabilities to lead change. Below is some of Shreya's thoughts regarding her experience so far.

"My experience at Project 351 on Saturday, January 19, was incredible. The group I was part of sorted food at the Greater Boston Food Bank. My job was to load food into the bins that would go down the conveyor belt. The entire time at the food bank, that's all I did, which doesn't seem like a lot, but everyone's small jobs truly added up to create a huge result. At the end of two hours, we had sorted over 50,000 lbs of food! Other groups of Ambassadors had volunteered at the Pine Street Inn, Cradles to Crayons, the McKay School, and Service Village. In total, our actions positively impacted 19,851 people! It was great to see that although individual efforts may seem insignificant, when you work together you can bring about astonishing change. It was amazing to me that my actions actually helped make someone else's life better, and I can't wait for the rest of my Ambassador year."

Relicensure Information from DESE

TO: Educators with Professional Licenses
FROM: Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education
RE: Information on License Renewal

Many educators throughout the Commonwealth hold Professional Level licenses that are due to be renewed in June 2019.

Please be advised that requirements for renewal of license changed in 2017. The basic requirements for licensure renewal are as follows:

A total of 150 PDPs are required for renewal of a primary license.

- At least 15 PDPs must be in the content of your area of licensure
- At least 15 PDPs must be in pedagogy (professional skills and knowledge)
- At least 15 PDPs must be related to Sheltered English Immersion (SEI)
- At least 15 PDPs related to training in strategies for effective schooling for students with disabilities and the instruction of students with diverse learning styles
- The remaining 90 PDPs is left to the discretion of the educator and school district. 80% of these must align with school, district or individual educator plan goals.

In order to renew you must obtain the signature and approval of your Supervisor. Please note that you may renew online through ELAR. The cost of renewing a primary license is \$100.

Additional licenses may be renewed. Each additional license requires a total of 30 PDPs (15 must be in content)

Once you apply online for renewal, approval should be immediately forthcoming. You have the option of applying in writing; however, approval of written applications is a slower process

Please note that even though your license is renewed you are subject to being audited for 5 years. Therefore, it is important that you keep a record of your PDPs as well as copy of you Supervisor's signature on either your IPDP or Educator Plan as these materials will be required for review by DESE if you are audited.

Haley Lightbody, Class of 2019

Since entering RMHS in the fall of 2015, Haley Lightbody has distinguished herself by approaching everything she takes on with a quiet and steady commitment and a strong determination to improve. Those who know Haley know that it is her attitude, not her achievements, that define her: but her achievements are many. First and foremost, Haley's academic record is stellar. She has a reputation as a responsible student who is not afraid to challenge herself in the classroom and who makes her academic work a priority even as she maintains a busy extra-curricular schedule. Haley's favorite class is AP Biology with Ms. Moore, and she plans to continue her study of biology when she attends Stonehill College in the fall. Athletically, Haley's accomplishments are historic.
